6-pack Can Rings

<u>The Ring Leader Recycling Program</u> (<u>www.ringleader.com</u>) will send you everything you need for collecting and shipping the rings back. Otherwise they can go directly into single stream recycling.

Batteries

Rechargeable batteries should be able to go back for recycling at any place that sells them such as Target, Radio Shack, some Wal Marts etc.

Unfortunately, there is no place locally that accepts the regular batteries right now (it's very expensive to recycle them, so it's cost prohibitive). You may have to throw them in the trash, or check out Earth 911 (http://search.earth911.com/) to see if there are any nearby collection facilities or other options.

Building Materials & Furniture

Collected cell phones are taken to a recycler who in turn pays the non-profit company, <u>Cell Phones for Soldiers</u>. Cell Phones for Soldiers use the funds to purchase calling cards for American soldiers to call home. Each cellular phone recycled gives a soldier nearly thirty minutes with loved ones. - <u>Earth 911</u>: Have household hazardous waste, batteries, cell phones or other items that you're just not sure how or where to recycle? Try the searchable database on this site to find the nearest collection location http://search.earth911.com/
- Amazon Trade-in Program: Accepts such a wide variety of products, from old DVDs to Wi-Fi routers, in exchange for Amazon gift cards. The process starts on the program's website, amazon.com/trade-in, where you can find out which items the retailer will buy (non-tech items can be sold, too.) Once you identify what you want to trade, the company will supply you with a free shipping label; you pack everything up and drop the packages off at a U.P.S. mailbox. A few weeks later, after Amazon has inspected each item, you should receive Amazon store credit.
- <u>Gazelle</u>: Gazelle (https://www.gazelle.com/), buys and sells used electronics, to sell. The company will give you a quote based on the condition and age of the item. They will give you the option to receive a free box with packing materials or to print out a free shipping label so you can pack and ship yourself. Once they receive and inspect the item, you should receive your money via PayPal, the popular payment service. In the event that a product is unusable and Gazelle declines the purchase, the company offers to recycle it responsibly free through its partner CloudBlue.
- <u>Best Buy</u>: Has a <u>nationwide recycling program</u> that it started about six years ago. The stores invite shoppers to drop off electronics, including televisions, batteries, ink cartridges and power cables, at kiosks or the customer service desk. Best Buy teams up with responsible recycling companies like <u>Electronics Recyclers International</u> and <u>Regency Technologies</u>. Most gadgets can be dropped off for recycling free at Best Buy, though some states require consumers to <u>pay a small fee</u> to recycle certain items, like old TVs.

Used Eyeglass Collection

Printer/Ink Cartridges

Madison County Schools have the opportunity to collect printer cartridges and ink jet cartridges on their own. Local stores like Office Depot offer recycling programs, but be sure you are aware of the requirements. Some options include:

- If your school or district has a contract with an office supply company, check with them. They often offer ink cartridge recycling as part of their services.
- Office Max, Office Depot, and Best Buy will only accept the smaller inkjet cartridges and will
 often max out at the number they will accept per month. You will receive in-store credit for
 recycling there.
- <u>Funding Factory</u> will send you the boxes for recycling the cartridges; the website says they
 accept all inkjet and toner cartridges, as well as cell phones and other items.
